Situated in the bastions below the Upper Barraka Gardens, along Valetta's eastern ramparts, this place brings history to life every day at 12:00 and 16:00 with its guns shooting in air.

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The Saluting Battery is best known for its ceremonial cannon fire. From Monday to Saturday, two loud salvos are fired -- one at 12:00 PM (the famous "noon gun") ...

The Saluting Battery (Maltese: Batterija tas-Salut) is an artillery battery in Valletta, Malta. It was constructed in the 16th century by the Order of Saint John, on or near the site of an Ottoman battery from the Great Siege of Malta. The battery forms the lower tier of St. Peter & Paul Bastion of the Valletta Land Front, located below the Upper Barrakka Gardens and overlooking Fort St. Angelo and the rest of the Grand Harbour.

After the end of the war it was used by NATO up to 1977 to track the movement of Soviet subs in the Mediterranean. Exclusive guided tours are offered twice daily one at 10.30 and another one at 13.00. ...
